ARTIST-FACULTY BIOS

Guy Yehuda, associate professor of clarinet at the MSU college of Music, has won several international competitions, such as the Heida Hermanns International Woodwind Competition and the Fischoff Chamber Music Competition. Hailed by composer John Corigliano as "One of the most awe-inspiring clarinetists today". Yehuda has toured extensively in Europe, North America, Israel, and China. As principal clarinetist, he has performed with the Israel Philharmonic, Lucerne Contemporary Festival Orchestra, Chicago Civic Orchestra, Spoleto Festival Orchestra, and Cincinnati Chamber Orchestra, among others, as well as guest clarinetist with the Chicago Symphony and ,Jacksonville Symphony Orchestras. Yehuda performed on tours of Europe and the U.S. under the batons of conductors including Pierre Boulez, Zubin Mehta, Kurt Masur and Daniel Barenboim. He performed and collaborated with composers and performers including Pierre Boulez, Steve Reich. John Corigliano, Menahem Pressler from the Beaux-Arts Trio, and the Cypress and Harrington String Quartets. A highly demanded musician, he has performed as soloist and chamber musician at the Spoleto, Verbier, Lucerne, Ottawa Chamber Music, Parry Sound, Kfar Blum festivals.

Yehuda is a sought-after recitalist throughout North America, Europe and Asia. He has performed as soloist in prestigious halls and venues such as Carnegie Hall, Domain Forget, Chicago Symphony Hall, Palacio Fuz and Casa di Musica in Portugal, Mann Auditorium in Tel Aviv and Dame Myra Hess Chamber Series. He has appeared regularly as a guest artist on Public Radio across the U.S and abroad, and he has been a frequent artist on a number of live recordings for CBC. Yehuda's discography recordings won many acclaims and rave reviews. His varied discography includes CDs on XII-21, Albany records, and Blue Griffin record labels.

Yehuda has given master classes throughout the U.S, Canada, Mexico, Brazil, Europe, China, and Israel. He is a Selmer-Paris and Vandoren performing artist and product consultant. He held visiting faculty positions at Indiana University and the University of Virginia and has been the clarinet professor at the University of North Florida. Currently, he is the principal clarinetist with the Lansing Symphony and Jackson Symphony Orchestras. He is the Artistic Director of the Henri Selmer International Summer Academy in Michigan, as well as the clarinet faculty resident at Aria International Music Festival in Massachusetts and Fresno Summer Orchestra Academy in California.

Genadi Zagor

A native of Krasnodar, Russia, Genadi Zagor began his music studies at the age of four with his father, a foremost guitarist and composer. He continued his piano studies at the Moscow Central Music School for gifted children with Tatiana Manuilskaya. After graduating from Krasnodar's Rimsky-Korsakov College of Music with distinction, he went on to study at the Moscow State Conservatory with Mikhail Mezhlumov. In 1991, Genadi immigrated to Israel and became an assistant to the world-renowned Piano Duo Bracha Eden-Alexander Tamir at the Jerusalem Rubin Academy of Music and Dance.

Mr. Zagor holds prizes from the Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition, USA; the Arthur Rubinstein International Piano Competition, Israel; the Leeds International Pianoforte competition, United Kingdom; the Hamamatsu International Piano Competition, Japan; and the Francois Shapira Music Competition, Israel. Mr. Zagor won top prizes from the World Piano Competition in Cincinnati, San Antonio International Piano competition in Texas, and the Grand Prize at the D'Angelo Young Artists Competition in Erie, Pennsylvania. In 2000, Genadi moved to the United States and

joined Alexander Toradze's Piano Studio at Indiana University (South Bend). After completing his Artist Diploma, Genadi accepted the position of Visiting Artist at the University of Northern Iowa.

Throughout his career, Genadi has performed on stages, at festivals, and with numerous symphony orchestras around the world. He has also appeared on radio and television programs. Genadi holds Master of Music and a Doctor of Musical Arts degrees in piano performance from Michigan State University where he serves as an Instructor of Piano in the College of Music.
