ARTIST FACULTY BIOS

Mezzo-soprano Jane Bunnell joined the faculty of MSU's College of Music in August, 2015, as professor of voice. She has enjoyed an illustrious international career for 40 years. She has an especially long association with the Metropolitan Opera where she has sung 30 roles in more than 420 performances, including new productions of Ariadne auf Naxos, Otello, Les Troyens, Faust, and Romeo et Juliette, and the Met premieres of Nico Muhly's Marnie, Britten's A Midsummer Nights' Dream, and Wolf-Ferrari's Sly. She has also recorded with the Met for Sony/BMG and has toured Europe and Japan. She is frequently heard on Sirius XM radio.

She has sung with the opera companies of Toulouse, Vienna, Cologne, and Schwetzingen, and with such American opera companies as Houston Grand Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, San Diego Opera, Minnesota Opera, Florida Grand Opera, and New York City Opera. Ms. Bunnell has collaborated with such notable conductors as James Levine, Valery Gergiev, Seiji Ozawa, and Robert Shaw. She has appeared in concert with the Boston Symphony, Lincoln Center's Mostly Mozart Festival, the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, the Atlanta Symphony, and the Minnesota Orchestra.

Marc Embree is an associate professor of voice at MSU's College of Music. Actor, singer, educator and story teller, Embree was a principal singer with the New York City Opera for several seasons and has performed throughout the United States, Mexico, Canada, and Europe. Embree received critical acclaim for his performance of Frank Maurrant in the Berlin/Ludwigshafen production of Street Scene: filmed for television. It has been released on DVD and widely broadcast. He created the role of William Emmons in The Village Singer by Stephen Paulus. The American opera and film composer. Thomas Pasatieri, asked him to create the role of the ghost of Ebeneezer Scrooge in his opera God Bless Us. Everyone in 2012. This recording joins his recordings of Carlos Chavez's *The Visitors*. Kurka's The Good Soldier Schweik, Rain by Richard Owen, and An American Howl Quartet by George Flynn. Embree also served as the narrator for the children's book *The Juggler* by Jeanette Hopkins. A dedicated teacher, his students have been appearing with increasing frequency in opera houses and theaters both here and abroad.

Named a Beal Outstanding Professor by Michigan State University and its current Area Chair of the Vocal Arts, tenor Richard Fracker has cultivated a distinguished performing and teaching resume. Career highlights include 14 international and national broadcasts from "Live at the MET"; world premiere productions of Philip Glass's The Voyage, Hydrogen Jukebox and Orphée; and international and national appearances including Calaf (Turandot), Cavaradossi (Tosca), Nadir, (Les Pêcheurs de Perles), Edgardo (Lucia di Lammermoor), Rodolfo (La Bohème), Hoffman (The Tales of Hoffman), Tonio (La Fille du Régiment), Duke (Rigoletto), and Alfredo (La Traviata), among others. Fracker students have routinely appeared professionally in major opera, musical theater, television, and concert venues throughout the world, earned prominent apprenticeships and residencies; won and placed in national and international vocal competitions (including the Metropolitan Council Auditions and NATS National Student Auditions); and secured substantial merit awards and teaching assistantships to the most prestigious graduate programs in the country.

Michael Kroth, professor of bassoon and associate dean for undergraduate studies at the MSU College of Music, has earned a reputation as an excellent solo, chamber, and orchestral musician. having performed in recitals and concerts throughout the U.S. and Germany. He served as principal bassoon with the South Dakota Symphony and Dakota Wind Quintet and has held positions as principal bassoonist with the Air Force Academy Band and the Colorado Springs Symphony Orchestra. Kroth is principal bassoon with the Lansing Symphony Orchestra, a faculty artist at the Colorado College Summer Music Festival, and at the Peninsula Music Festival (Door County, WI). \ He performs regularly with the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra and the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, and the Cleveland Orchestra. He has also performed with the Trenton Symphony, the Colorado Ballet, and the Philadelphia Orchestra. He earned his bachelor's degree in bassoon performance from Ithaca College and a Master of Music in bassoon performance from Temple University. He has released recordings on the Sound Works, Ultrasound, AFSC, and HCS labels.

Elden Little joined the faculty of Michigan State University College of Music in the fall of 2014 as a vocal coach. Previously, he worked as a pianist/coach in more than 70 operatic productions that range from baroque operas to contemporary works by composers such as Jonathan Dove, Carlise Floyd, Philip Glass, Jake Heggie, and Andre Previn. While working at Austin Opera, he worked as a pianist/coach, music administrator, orchestra manager and orchestra librarian. Additional collaborations include Des Moines Metro Opera, where he has been a member of the music staff since 2006, Opera Birmingham, Kentucky Opera, and San Antonio Opera. Since 2012, he has been a faculty member of Opera NEO, a San Diego-based summer festival/training program. In addition to his work as a vocal coach, he also was a member of the faculty of the Austin Chamber Music Summer Festival and Workshop.

He has accompanied numerous singers, most notably internationally acclaimed soprano Gilda Cruz-Romo, in recitals in Texas and Mexico. He has toured with the Austin-based choral ensemble Conspirare, and can be heard as a featured soloist on their recording "Through the Green Fuse", available on the Clarion label. He has accompanied the master classes of Jane Bunnell, Denyce Graves, Brenda Harris, Marilyn Horne, Martin Katz, Catherine Malfitano, Elizabeth Mannion, Suzanne Mentzer, Samuel Ramey, Martial Singher, and Gerard Souzay. He has a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of California at Santa Barbara in piano performance, and Master's and Doctorate degrees in applied piano from the University of Texas at Austin. His collaborative piano studies were with noted collaborative pianists Eugene Bossart, David Garvey, and Gwendolyn Koldofsky.

Deborah Moriarty is professor of piano and chair of the piano area at the Michigan State University College of Music, where she is a recipient of the Distinguished Faculty Award. A Massachusetts native, she made her debut with the Boston Symphony Orchestra at age 11. She has also served on the piano faculty at the New England Conservatory of Music and the University of Lowell.

Moriarty attended the Curtis Institute of Music, the Juilliard School, and the New England Conservatory of Music, where she received her Master of Music degree with honors. She has studied with Russell Sherman, Theodore Lettvin, and Beveridge Webster.

An active recitalist and soloist with orchestras throughout the eastern United States, she has also performed in Belgium, Japan, Colombia, Mexico, and the Soviet Union. Moriarty is a founding member of the Fontana Ensemble of Michigan, and as an advocate of new music, has participated in numerous premiere performances including Milton Babbitt's "Whirled Series" at Merkin Hall in New York City. She has recordings on the Crystal and CRI labels.

Soprano **Anne Nispel** joined the MSU Voice faculty in 2004. She received a Bachelor of Music from Wittenberg University, a Master of Music from the University of Michigan, and a Doctorate of Musical Arts from the University of Michigan.

In a review of her New York recital debut, Ms. Nispel has "a clear, attractive timbre, ample power, and a good command of languages. She also has a fine sense of style [...] She sang with [...] crisp articulation and careful shading."

Nispel has performed more than 30 leading roles with opera companies throughout the United States, including Kentucky Opera, Virginia Opera, Mississippi Opera, Michigan Opera Theatre, Portland Opera, Kansas City Lyric Opera, Cleveland Opera, Opera Company of Mid-Michigan, Chattanooga Opera, Dayton Opera, Des Moines Metro Opera, and Toledo Opera.

Dubbed the "quintessential soubrette" by the Virginia Press, Nispel is noted for her interpretations of Susanna in *The Marriage of Figaro*, Zerlina in *Don Giovanni*, Lauretta in *Gianni Schicchi*, and Adele in *Die Fledermaus*.

Sarah Southard is currently the interim oboe instructor at Michigan State University for spring semester 2022. She is also the oboe instructor at Hope College and a member of the Holland and Midland Symphony Orchestras. As an advocate for new music, Sarah has been involved with several commissions for chamber music that includes oboe and has performed at both the International Double Reed Society and National Flute Association conferences. Additional concert performances include groups such as the Lansing Symphony Orchestra (MI), West Michigan Symphony Orchestra (MI), Chautauqua Symphony Orchestra (NY), the New World Symphony Orchestra (FL), the Cincinnati Symphony Opera Orchestra (OH), and the Madison Symphony and Chamber

Orchestras (WI). In addition to her active performing schedule, Sarah has taught previously at Michigan State University (sabbatical replacement), Central Michigan University, University of Michigan-Flint, Northern Kentucky University, Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, and the Interlochen Center for the Arts All-State Orchestra and All-State Band.

Southard received her Doctorate of Musical Arts degree from Michigan State University with oboist Jan Eberle, her Master's Degree at the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music with Mark Ostoich, and her undergraduate degree from the University of Wisconsin-Madison studying with Marc Fink.

Zhihua Tang

Corbin Wagner received his Bachelor's Degree in 1979 from the University of Michigan. Upon graduation, he became a member of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and later received his Master degree from U of M in 1989. Prior to his appointment at Michigan State University, he served as adjunct horn professor at Oakland University, the University of Michigan, and Wayne State University.

Wagner has received many prestigious performing honors, including a third prize at the 1983 Munich International Horn Competition. He also took first prize at the Heldenleben International Horn Competition in hand horn, valve horn, and horn quartet. He will soon be releasing his second cd featuring new works for horn, soprano, and piano.

Mingzhe Wang, a recipient of the Tennessee Arts Commission's 2013 Individual Artist Fellowship award, is committed to the music of our time and the classics. He gave the Chinese premiere of Elliott Carter's *Hiyoku*, and has worked closely with some of the world's leading composers. He performed the Copland *Clarinet Concerto* in its original version with the Gateway Chamber Orchestra, and has performed on period clarinets with prominent groups such as The American Classical Orchestra and the Clarion Music Society Orchestra. As a chamber musician, Wang has collaborated and continues working with some of the most prominent young artists today. His performances have been broadcast on China's Central Television, New York's WQXR, Nashville's WPLN, and many public radio stations across North America.

A native of Wuhan, China, Wang first studied clarinet at the age of nine, and gave his first public performance at the age of ten. He received the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from Yale University, where he also obtained his Master's degree and Artist Diploma. His major teachers include David Shifrin, Charles Neidich, Ayako Oshima, and Paul Green. Wang was previously an associate professor of clarinet at Austin Peay State University in Clarksville, Tennessee. He is a founding member of the Gateway Chamber Orchestra and a co-founder of Trio Séléné.
