

SYNOPSIS

Act I, Scene 1: the morning room of Lady Billows' home

Florence is clearing the breakfast dishes for her employer, Lady Billows. We hear the voice of Lady Billows from upstairs, barking out orders for Florence as far as community order concerns. Florence bemoans that there are not enough hours in the day to please Lady B. Miss Wordsworth (a teacher), Mr. Gedge (the Vicar), Mr. Upfold (the Mayor) and Police Superintendent Budd arrive. Their purpose is a meeting to choose the "May Queen" for the annual festival. They proclaim that they are ready to serve to make this very important choice. Lady Billows arrives, greeting them a courteous "good morning." Half in awe and half in fear, they get down to business. Florence takes out her notebook, full of the results of her snooping around the town for "evildoing." As each of the others suggest a possible May Queen, Florence checks her book and knocks them off the list. After all, the May Queen is supposed to be pure and virginal, and it seems that none of the young girls in the town are such. Lady Billows is enraged that the town "reeks of sensual shame." The others are ashamed and dismayed. Superintendent Budd makes a suggestion: have they ever thought of a May King? They scoff at the idea, but then begin thinking about it. Budd proposes a local lad. Albert Herring, He extols his virtue and purity, saying that he would be ideal. The others know him as a bit simple, but a good youth. Lady Billows makes a decision: "Right! We'll have him! That'll teach the girls a lesson!"

Act I, Scene 2: Herring & Son Greengrocer shop

Emmie, Cis and Harry, three local kids, are playing ball outside the Herring greengrocer shop. Harry tosses the ball into the apparently empty shop and goes in after it. He discovers a basket of apples and is in the process of pinching a few when Sid, the butcher's assistant, enters. Sid chases them off and Albert enters the shop from within, carrying a huge bag of turnips. Sid has come for some herbs and asks Albert if he wants to toss double or nothing from them. Albert explains that his Mum doesn't approve of any bad behavior, such as gambling or drinking. Sid teases Albert, asking if he never wanted to have a drink, toss some dice or go with a girl. Albert is embarrassed. Nancy, a lovely local girl, enters the shop on an errand. Sid has been seeing Nancy, and the two flirt while Albert looks on. Albert secretly likes Nancy and is jealous of Sid's ease with her. Sid and Nancy make a date for that night in secret, and leave together. Florence enters the shop, ready for the big announcement of Albert as May King. Mrs. Herring ("Mum") invites her in, saying that she's not really ready for visitors. Lady Billows, Miss Wordsworth, the Mayor, the Vicar and Superintendent Budd all traipse in and they declare that Albert will be May King and win a prize of 25 sovereigns in gold. Mum is overjoyed as the team leaves, but Albert wants nothing to do with it. They argue, with Albert saying he won't do it and Mum insisting that he is an ingrate.

SYNOPSIS (cont.)

Act II, Scene 1: an outside pavilion for the May Festival

Nancy and Florence are putting the final touches on the luncheon for the Festival. Florence is complaining that Sid is late with the final boxes. Sid arrives late because of a puncture in his bicycle tire. Florence yells at him, then stomps off to have her photograph taken with the others. Nancy can tell that Sid has something up his sleeve. He slyly tells her that he is planning to spike Albert's lemonade with a little rum, just to loosen him up. Nancy is worried but goes along with the plan. Lady Billows arrives with the others, and the children, who have been rehearsing their songs with Miss Wordsworth, present flowers to the luminaries present. Albert enters, miserable, dressed in a white suit and wearing an orange blossom wreath. The Vicar, acting as Master of Ceremonies, invites Lady Billows to speak. She goes off on flights of fancy about the past, and at some point drops her notecards, and tries to continue with platitudes. All applaud, and one by one they salute Albert. Albert is asked to speak, and can only stammer out, "thank you." He drinks some of the spiked lemonade, which gives him the courage to offer a toast to Lady Billows. He drinks some more and gets the hiccups. All offer suggestions as he drinks more and more. They sit down to luncheon.

Act II, Scene 2: back in the shop

Albert, well in his cups, staggers back into the dark shop. He thinks over the events of the afternoon with some bemusement over the amount of food and over the top activity. He tries to light the gas, but it flares up and scares him. He starts to realize how much his mother has stifled him, and in a state of courage, he tosses a coin. "Heads," he says, and decides to take his prize money and go off on a tear. Mum comes in after he's left and assumes he's asleep upstairs.

Act III: in the shop

Albert has been missing for most of the day. Nancy is in the shop, taking care of things so that Mum can rest. The others are out looking for him. Both Emmie and the Superintendent stop by to report on the results of the search. Sid reports that so far all they've found is a dead sheep. Nancy tries to calm Mum, but she is inconsolable at the thought of Albert being gone. The Vicar and Miss Wordsworth also try to console Mum to no avail. Sid. the Mayor and Superintendent enter, carrying Albert's bedraggled orange wreath. They all join in singing a "threnody" of pain and grief for Albert's loss. As their voices rise almost in hysteria, Albert enters, somewhat disheveled and asks what's going on? They turn on him, yelling at him as to where he's been. He tries to tell them and after many interruptions, he spins the tale of a night of drunkenness that he's never experienced. They are all horrified, particularly at the fact that he spent three of the twentyfive sovereigns on drink. They leave, disappointed that their May King has fallen. Sid and Nancy congratulate Albert on his freedom, and Nancy rewards him with a kiss. As the kids come back into the shop, they sing their round-the-rosy as all is well.
